Head Lice in School

It has come to our notice that there have been cases of head lice in Year 5.

We are asking for your help to help stop the spread of infestation. Please could every family check their child's hair tonight.

Below is an extract from NHS Direct regarding the treatment of head lice.

Head lice are difficult to remove because of their size, re-infestation rate, life cycle and their ability to develop immunity to insecticides. Lice can be a persistent and recurring nuisance, so it is important to treat them quickly and thoroughly.

Once infestation is confirmed it can be treated at home using wet combing with conditioner, or medicated lotions, combined with a special nit comb.

Wet Combing Method

Wet combing or "bug busting" is used to remove lice without using chemical treatments: Wash the hair as normal.

- Apply conditioner liberally (this causes the lice to lose their grip on the hair).
- Comb the hair through with a normal comb first.
- With a fine tooth nit comb, comb from the roots along the complete length of the hair and after each stroke check the comb for lice and wipe it clean. Work methodically over the whole head for at least 30 minutes.
- Rinse the hair as normal.
- Repeat every three days for at least two weeks.

This method can be helpful because head lice are growing increasingly resistant to the insecticides used to remove them.

There is no need to wash clothing or bedding specially – any lice found away from the scalp are likely to be damaged, dead or dying and so unable to start a new colony.



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We have a supply of bug busting combs which are available from the school office, price 60p. Most chemists also stock them.

Ideally, you should check your child's hair from time to time to make sure they have not returned. If your child does have head lice we ask you to report the problem to the school office and we will send out a letter to the whole year group asking parents to re-check their children. We don't mention any child's name and treat the matter with the utmost discretion. Please do let us know, otherwise it is very hard to rid the school of the outbreak.

I hope this information is helpful. Don't forget to ensure you check your child's hair tonight and hopefully we'll be a bug free zone as soon as possible.
